




GGP is winner of the American Association of Law Libraries' 2003 Public Access to Government Information Award



Developed in 1996 as GALILEO's first digital conversion initiative and redesigned in 2009, the Georgia Government Publications (GGP) database serves as a digital repository of over 47,000 documents and publications released by agencies of Georgia's executive branch.

In addition to archiving Georgia state publications from 1994 to the present, GGP is currently adding pre-1994 serials on an ongoing basis. The following titles have already been added:


