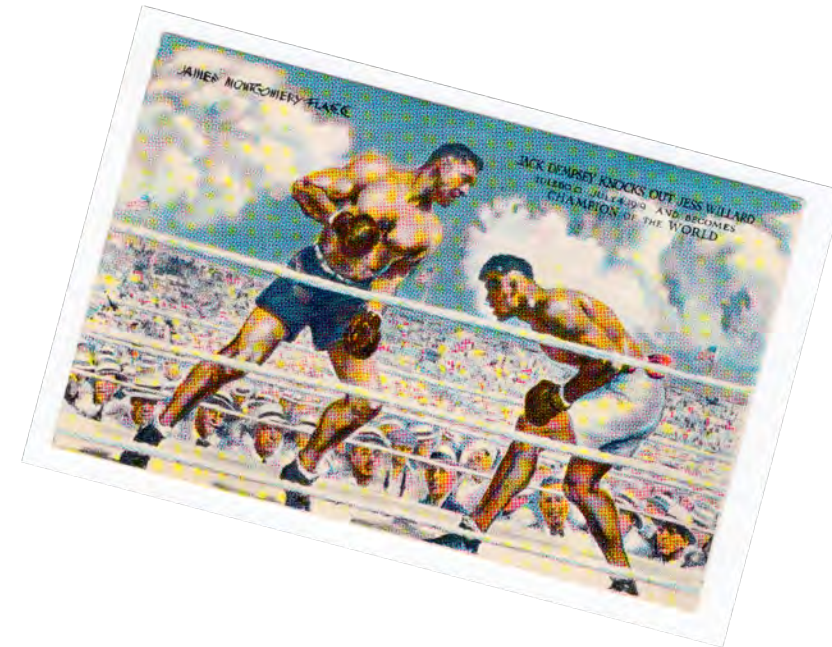

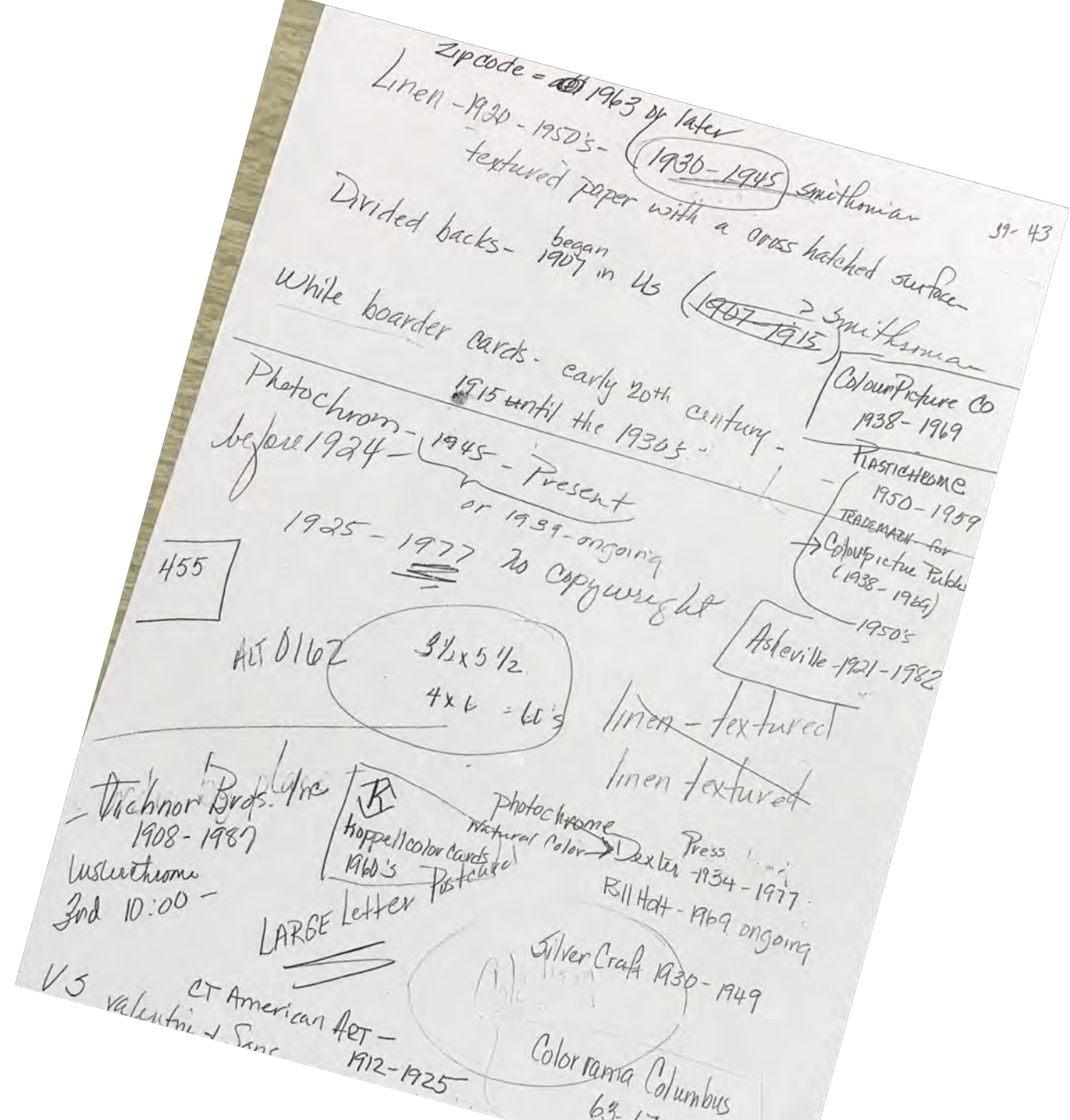

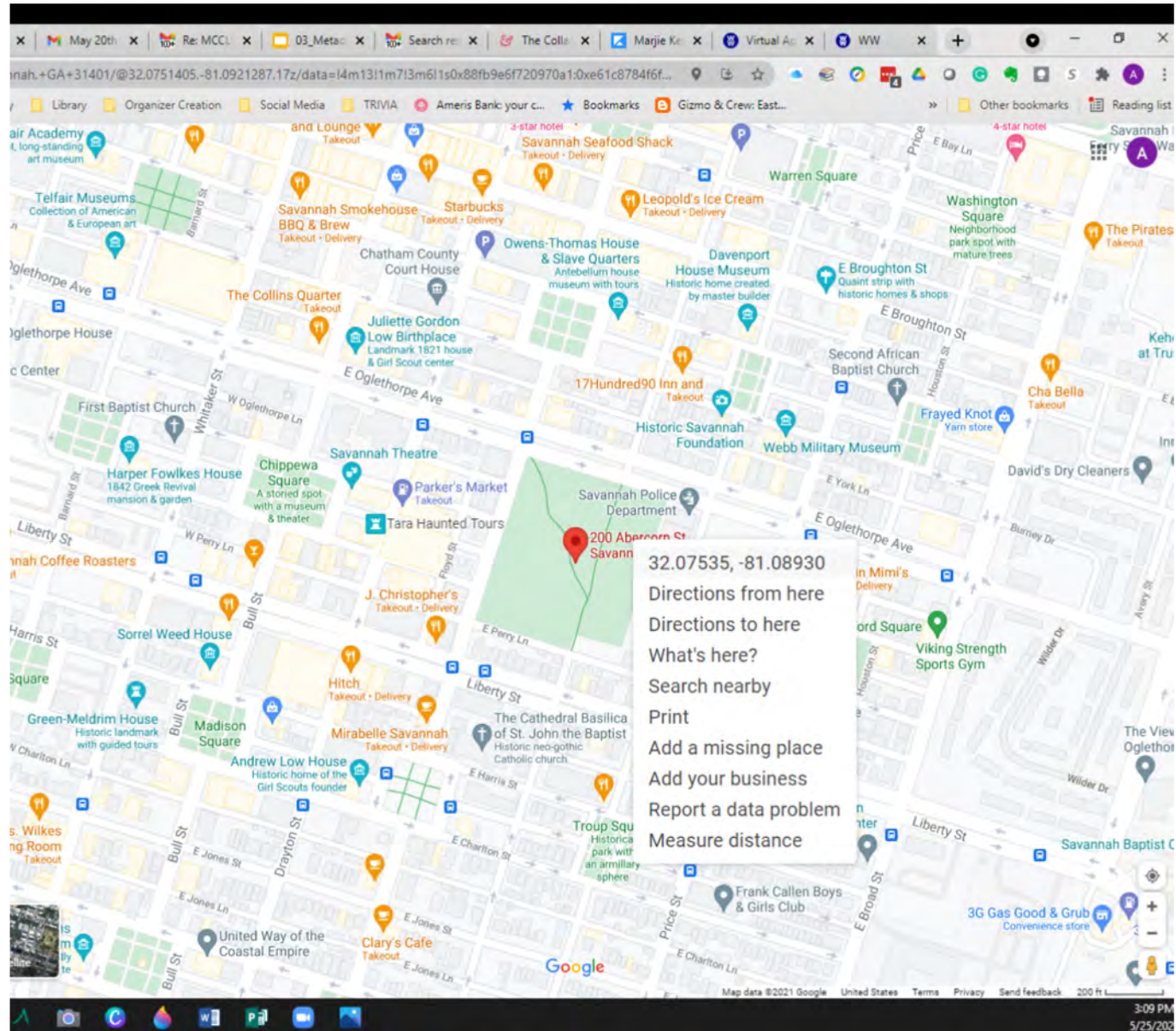

Descriptions

Postcard (**color, oilette, divided back, 3 1/2 x 5 1/2 inches**) titled The Macleod –The inset shows a depiction of Glen Sligachan, Skye. Text on reverse: The Macleod. This clan is divided into two important branches – the Macleods of Harris, the descendants of Tormod (or Norman), and the Macleods of Lewis, the descendants of Torquill, both sons of Olave, the last Norwegian King of Man and the Isles, whose kingdom was broken up in the 13th century. There are also a number of important cadet families of this name. The present chief of the clan is the 23rd in direct succession, his seat being Dunvegan Castle, on the west coast of Skye. The clan suffered very heavily at the Battle of Worcester in 1651, fighting for Charles II. They also took a large share in the wars in America and India at the end of the 18th century. Their motto is “Hold Fast” and their badge “Juniper.” The tartan here shown is commonly called the Dress tartan. "Scottish Clans" Series VI 9481. **Printed in England.**

***Note:** This card is one of the Scottish Clan Postcards produced by the famous Raphael Tuck Company of London. Each card shows the clan tartan, clan emblem, plant, and either the traditional clan seat or a picturesque landscape from the clan's traditional “stomping ground.” The series was first issued in 1906. It consisted of seven sets of six cards each. Each card was labeled “Oilette” which refers to a particular type of postcard production. In 1883, Queen Victoria granted the firm the Royal Warrant of Appointment. Tuck cards thereafter bore the message, "Art Publishers to Her Majesty the Queen". Future sovereigns continued the warrant of appointment.

Descriptions

Postcard (**color, linen textured, divided back, 3 1/2 x 5 1/2 inches**) titled **Fort Frederica, St. Simons Island, Ga.** - Text on reverse: Fort Frederica, now a National Monument, was built in 1736 by General James Edward Oglethorpe and played an important part in the wars between Spain and England.

Postmarked: St. Simons Island, GA Jun 16, 1955 2:00pm

Postage affixed— *2 cent Jefferson stamp*. Card number K7992.

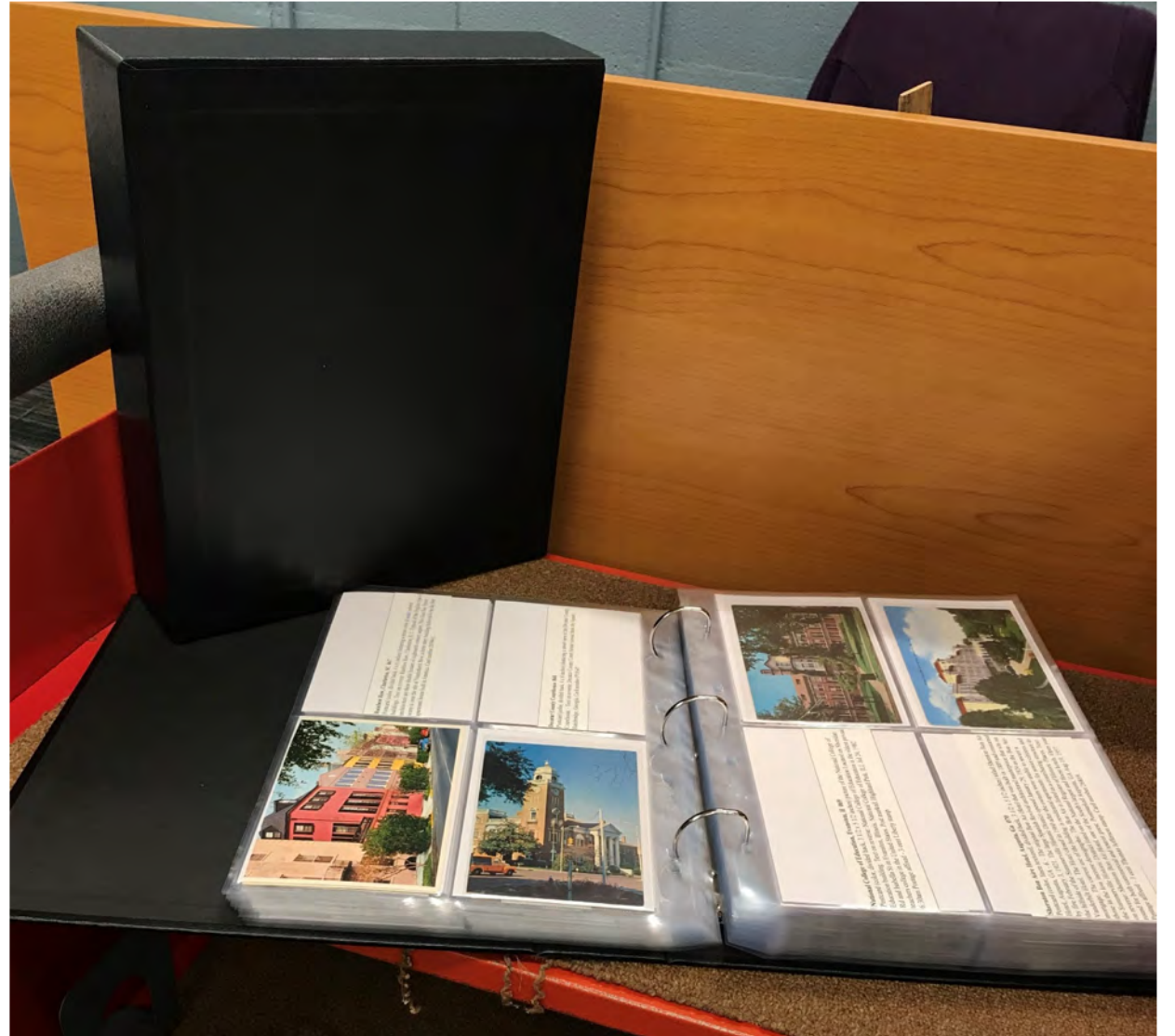

Forsyth County News


- The newspaper of record for Forsyth County and the city of Cumming.
- Received permission from the publisher to digitize issues from 1916 through the beginning of 2013, approximately 165,000 pages.
- Later received permission from the publisher to digitize issues from 2013 through the last issue of 2019.

Funding

- Archival Services and Digital Initiatives (Georgia HomePLACE) grant through the Digital Library of Georgia
- Regular Library materials budget
- Library fund balance

Timeline

- Digitization has covered three fiscal years: FY2019, FY2020, FY2021
- Fourth fiscal year of digitization in FY2022

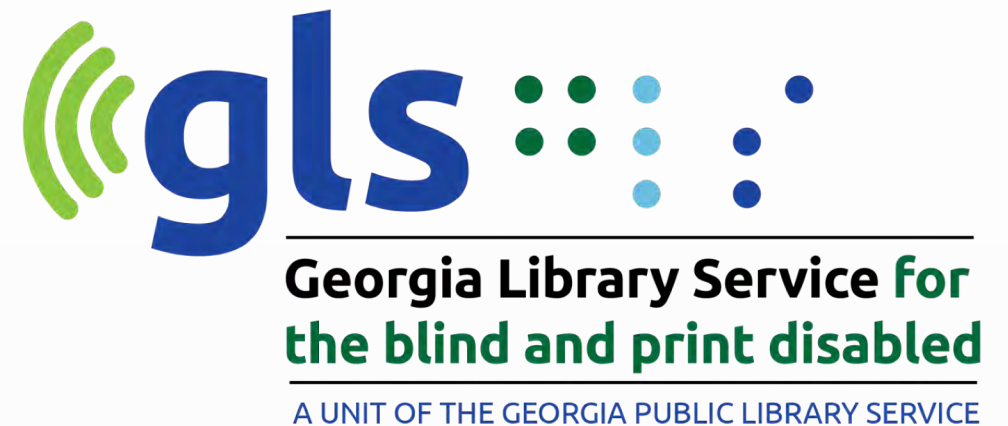

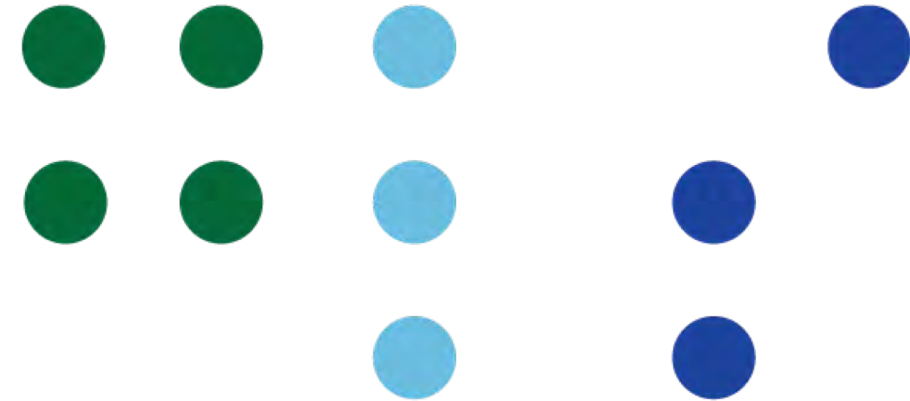

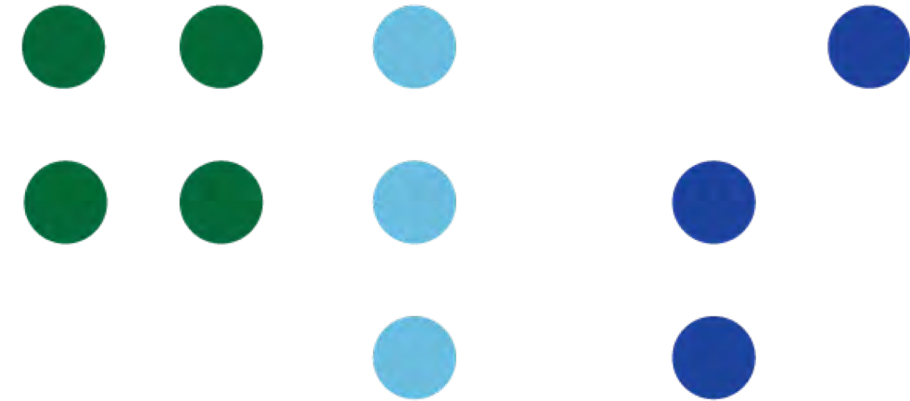


Through the Georgia Library Service for the blind and print disabled (GLS), Georgia Public Library Service provides library services for individuals who are blind and to those whose physical abilities require the use of books and magazines in audio format or in braille.

- Create a repository of personal histories of people with disabilities.
- The repository had to be easy to access, and accessible for users with disabilities.
- Educate the public through the voices of those within the community of persons with disabilities
- Create awareness of GLASS



- Gather equipment
- Select subjects to interview
- Solicit help from partners around the state
- Identify hosting agent
- Acquire professional transcripts
- Check for accessibility
- Publicize



“Interviewees shared their experiences with us, whether it was a life story or a period of time that was significant to them,” said Georgia Libraries for Accessible Statewide Services (GLASS) Outreach Librarian Stephanie Irvin, who managed the project. “We heard such a variety of beautiful stories that exemplify both how unique our patrons are and the rich lives they have; this collection challenges the general perception of what it means to live with disability.”

Savannah Tribune and the Importance of Digitizing Certain Years

- Savannah's most important and one of the longest-running African American historical resources in the South
- First edition called the "Colored Tribune"
- First published in 1875
- Not published 1878-1886 and 1960-1973
- We had October 1943-September 1960 to digitize
 - Includes much of the developing Civil Rights Movement in Georgia



Savannah Tribune Availability Online

- July 2008-Present is available online on their website
- October 1886-November 15, 1913 issues were already on Georgia Historic Newspapers
- Importance of this project
 - To provide researchers and the public with 24/7 access to this resource.
 - To preserve this newspaper's unique historical perspective on events of the day.

Copyright Investigation

- We used 6 microfilm reels and the Cornell University Public Domain Chart to help determine if the Savannah Tribune was in the public domain, taking one person 2.5 days to investigate.
- Things to consider regarding copyright
 - Syndicated content like cartoons
 - Catalog of Copyright entries
 - Examine two issues from every year, preferably coming from different parts of the year. Notate your findings, including full title, year, issue checked, copyright notice, copyright ads, etc.



Now What?

- The Digital Library of Georgia digitizes from the original microfilm, adds the metadata, and uploads the new issues to the Georgia Historic Newspaper website.

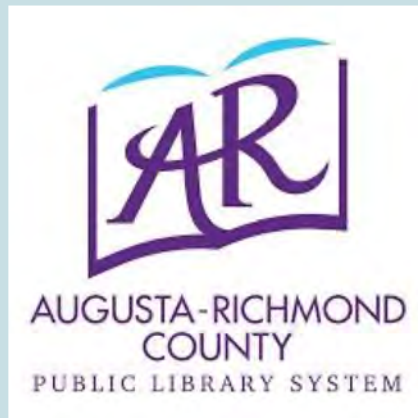

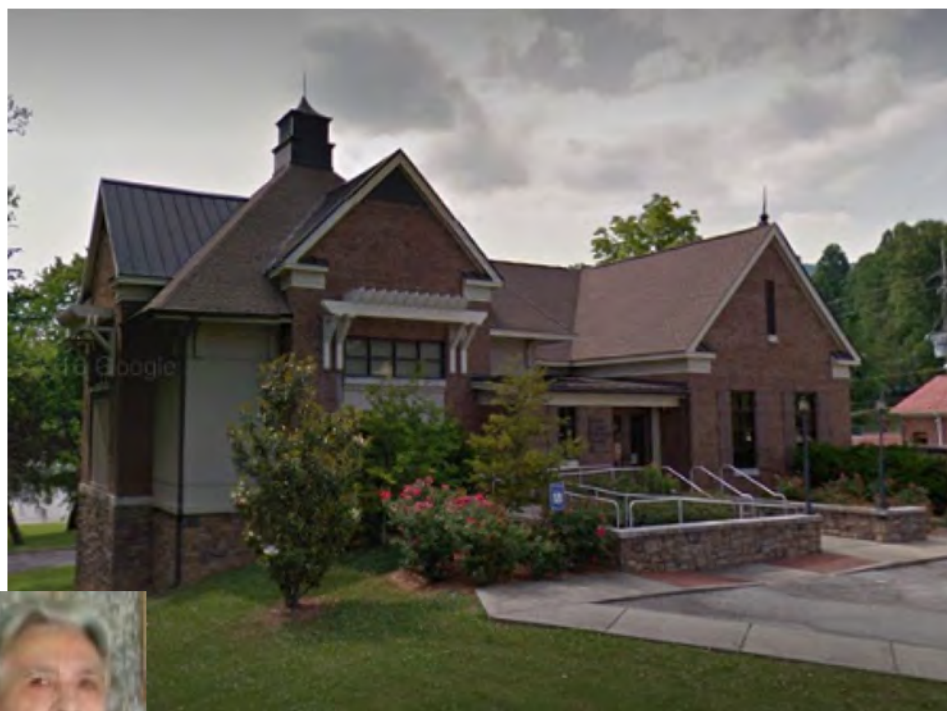

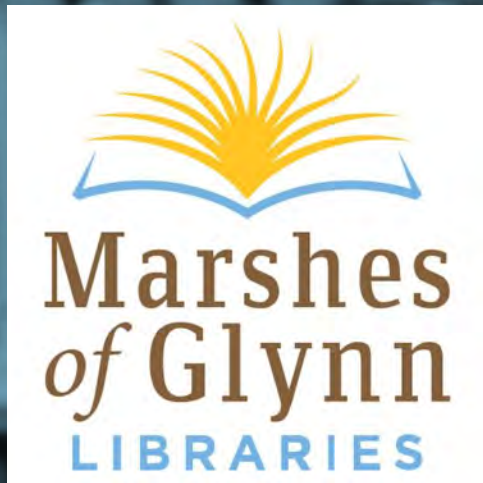
