Guide to APA In-text Citations

Use the following guidelines when preparing in-text citations in APA style. For more information, see American Psychological Association. (2010). *Publication manual of the American Psychological Association* (6th ed.). Washington, DC: American Psychological Association.

For each outside source used in a text, you need:

- an in-text citation in the body of your text when you quote, paraphrase, or summarize
- · an entry in the Reference List at the end of your paper

This handout addresses in-text citations.

In-text citations must include the following items:

- author's last name(s)
- date of publication
- · (a) page number(s) for direct quotations and paraphrases

In-text citations can be done in two ways:


 Use a signal phrase that introduces the author's name followed by the year of publication in parentheses. Signal phrases should be written in past or present perfect tense. If you are including a direct quote, put the page number in parentheses after the quote.


Example: Rackers (2003) has found that "most college students feel depressed at some point during their college careers" (p. 11). (This citation shows that the *direct quote* comes from p. 11 of Rackers's text, which was published in 2003.)

Example: Rackers (2003) noted that while college students often battle bouts of depression, few seek professional help (p. 11). (This citation shows that the writer *paraphrased* ideas from Rackers's text published in 2003.)





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

What are Research Databases?

Research databases are collections of information sources and are valuable tools for academic research. Use research databases to find articles in scholarly journals, popular magazines, newspapers, reference works, and other sources unavailable on the open web. GSU Library's research databases also contains e-books, streaming videos, and links to highly reputable websites.

How do I get to GSU Library research databases?

Use your GSU Username and password to log in. (Same as iCollege log in.)

- Use the Discover search widget on the homepage to conduct a basic search, find databases by subject, or locate specific in Databases A-Z...

LITERATURE DATABASES

These databases are your best bets for literary criticism and author biographies in the order I recommend them for most literature projects. Click on the title to go to the database.



For Students (Complete Collection)

Not every literary work has a "For Students" article, but if yours is, this is a great place to start. Each work will have an author biography, an overview, characters, themes, historical context, and some critical analysis articles. You can also access For Students through Gale Literary Sources.



Gale Literary Sources

Gale Literary Sources brings together collections of essays, commentary, criticism, primary sources and biographical information related to literature, history and culture from a variety of sources including content from Literature Criticism Online and selected authoritative reference works from Gale Virtual Reference Library. To access articles from the For Students series, search for the name of your work, then scroll down to see the search limiters for "Publication Title." Choose the appropriate "For Students" work from that list.
