## Make sure that people can get into your building and easily move about

### Exercise One:

Objective:

Become familiar with the basics of ADA compliance for a public facility, focusing on public library services

- Review the IFLA Access to Libraries for Persons with Disabilities Checklist
- Tour your own facility with a partner to record observations.
- Prepare a report of things that you can immediately remedy; things that will require architectural or maintenance support; things that can be addressed with future purchase of equipment
- Prepare a plan to address the problems you have found.
- Present this plan to appropriate people in your organization or community



## Make sure that people can access your computers

### Exercise Two:

#### **Objective:**

Become familiar with the accessibility features built into the operating systems of your public access computers so that you can assist library customers with these tools

- Identify the operating systems on your OPACS
  - Windows
  - macOS/iOS
  - Chrome
- Using Help Screens or using the OS's website learn the features and their utility
- Example for Windows 10:
  - Visit Microsoft's Accessibility website and review its content, specifically the Guides found in the Resources section
  - Explore Windows "Ease of Access" setting found in Control Panel
  - Explore the options and set up a PC based on the directed suggestions in Ease of Access module, for various circumstances of users—blind, mobility impaired, etc.
  - Open a Word document that you have previously prepared and navigate through it using various settings and modes
- If you are not in a Windows environment, try the same exercises in appropriate operating system.



## Add a screen reader program to your public computers

## Exercise Three:

#### **Objective:**

Become familiar with screen reader software such as NVDA and/or JAWS

- Watch the <u>GLASS-produced webinar on screen readers</u>
- If you library has JAWS installed on OPACs explore that product
- <u>Download NVDA</u> and install on your PC
- Review the <u>following video tutorials</u>
- Use NVDA to navigate a webpage
- Use NVDA to navigate a Word document
- Access how your experience differs from using the built-in Windows Narrator feature



## Learn to create accessible documents

### Exercise Four:

#### **Objective:**

Learn the tools available in Microsoft Word and PowerPoint to create accessible documents and create accessible documents that can be navigated with a screen reader.

- Review <u>Microsoft's accessibility tips</u>
- Install the MS Check Accessibility on your Word 'Ribbon' on the 'Review' tab- (Tip: Right-click the ribbon and follow instructions! Be sure that you choose the option from "All Commands", not "Popular Commands)
- Create a document in MS Word using the Styles buttons to create the navigation points for Title, headings and subheadings.
  - Run the Check Accessibility tool
  - Make suggested changes, noting the helpful instructions that Word provides in the checker tool
  - Open NVDA to navigate the document. Use commands to jump from heading to heading.
  - Enable the Microsoft Narrator and navigate or read the document
- Repeat this process for PowerPoint
  - Note the special issues for PowerPoint including reading a slide in order on the page, marking decorative elements on the page, etc.

#### **Objective:**

Learn what resources GLASS offers and how to enroll an eligible patron

- Take the GLASS tutorials on Georgia Public Library Service Learning Center
- Watch the short, but catchy <u>GLASS YouTube video</u>
- Explore the <u>GLASS webpages</u> to learn more about the service
- Practice filling out a GLASS individual application online, then print and sign
- Explore the <u>GLASS online catalog</u>
- Explore the <u>Bookshare online catalog</u>
- Challenge yourself to enroll at least one customer!
