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Some homeschooling stats and trends

Nationally, there were an estimated **3.135 million** homeschool students (i.e., school-age, ages 5 to under 18, K-12) in the United States during the 2021-2022 school year.

For context, this was more than in Catholic schools (1.688 million; National Catholic Educational Association (2022) and probably slightly fewer than in government public charter schools (Houston, Peterson, & West, 2022).

Nationally, homeschooling has grown from nearly extinct in the United States in the 1970s to over 2.5 million school-age students in 2023.

In Georgia, 4.83 percent of all K-12 students (91, 296) are home-schooled.



About the Firefly Homeschool Community



Quick takeaways from our event survey

- Homeschooling supports neurodivergent kids (and parents!)
- Homeschooling provides flexibility when travel is part of a parent's career.
- Instructors find that it is difficult to determine if paid or free services/resources offer the best quality/value?).
- (Students respond well to hands-on/active learning.
- Instructors are looking for resources that are rigorous, secular, and authoritative.
- Books are sought first, then primary sources, then articles (this may depend on grade level).
- Instructors are looking for fun and engaging content.
- Content must be responsive to our child's/children's needs.
- Most families were not aware of GALILEO and DLG resources.






Shouts out and sidebar: Neurodivergence

What is the most challenging thing about building a homeschool curriculum?

Finding the right resources can be very tough, and knowing which resources are worth paying for and which ones are free is a challenge as well. Connecting with other homeschoolers in the community has helped in curriculum selection a lot.

Marketing tip and explanation to homeschool families:

Google searches are based on advertising keywords, and will **always** skew to who pays the most to put those words in front of you.

They're also more than likely to drive you to a place where you **have to buy something**.





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The Inside Scoop: Georgia Statewide Groups

Identify Facebook groups where folks from multiple communities are engaged - these are closed groups so you must be an "insider" to engage and make posts, etc.


- ND [neurodivergent] Homeschoolers (national group, but good for research)
- Quirky Kids of Athens (lots of homeschoolers from multiple groups)
- Athens Secular Homeschoolers
- Tons more...
- In state of Georgia alone upwards of 20K between the different groups and members!







What Does This Look Like?

Mostly private groups based on larger community areas - over 20K in the state of Georgia!











The Inside Scoop: Takeaways

Why being an insider is SO important:

- You can gauge (like a focus group!) the needs of the communities
- Parents can definitely use the resources AND some basic info lit assistance to better know how to search for things and find the best materials
- Students can also use skills and benefit from outside instruction
- Events like National History Day can be incorporated into co-op style classes to have larger impact on the families/students
- Knowing individual community/family locations and sense of schedules helps to better plan future events to meet users where they are!
- We are building shared Zotero libraries with resources for these niche groups





Successful Outreach & Promotion

- A multi-faceted approach can best meet the widest range of user needs.
- Meeting families where they are schedule-wise accommodates differences in location, work, time, a technology aptitude.
- It also helps better accommodate users who self-identify largely as neurodivergent and might benefit from a variety of learning styles.




Assessment of Our First Event

Reviewing the information on our previous slide, the following were considered:

- Tech divide and issues from off-campus = 6 families!
- Difficulties navigating to in-person = 2 families!
- # of Users planned to (RSVP) but did not = 10 families!
- Personal feedback from users who said they reviewed recordings asynchronously = 7 families!

TOTAL REACHED: 17 families! (15 students, 17 parents)

Our Plans for the Next Meetup

More effective to "go and meet people directly" We should select a meeting place and go to meet people.
