GALILEO Strategic Plan

GALILEO has several long-term goals outlined in its strategic plan (on the website at this <u>link</u>). Below is an update on the projects for fiscal year 2020.

GALILEO Support Activities

OpenAthens

- Brenau University, Life University, and Augusta University recently went live with OpenAthens.
- Implementation work for GPALS institutions is ongoing.
- OpenAthens, EBSCO, GALILEO and GPLS PINES team are working together to complete the OpenAthens infrastructure for public libraries. 3 PINES public library systems have volunteered to be OpenAthens public library pilots.

GALILEO Development Advisory Committee (GDAC)

GALILEO asked for volunteers for GDAC membership in August. New members were notified in early September. GDAC meetings will resume in late September as work begins on the second phase of the GALILEO redesign.

GALILEO Redesign

At this time, most of the post-launch technical issues are resolved, including issues with GALILEO express links and GALILEO embedded search boxes.

GALILEO developers and systems administrators continue to troubleshoot an issue where users are occasionally prompted for a GALILEO password when they are already logged in.

Our development team continued to meet throughout August to plan the second phase of the redesign. The team is identifying priorities for the next phase of the project. Feedback to date has led the team to explore ideas for improved subject headings, a true A-Z database facet, and a way to provide additional children's views for public and academic libraries. The GALILEO team will be meeting regularly with the GALILEO Development Advisory Committee to set development priorities for phase two.

ALG Champions

The former "Champions and Coordinators" team has been restructured as the <u>ALG Champions</u> and now includes a Faculty Champion, a Library Champion, and a Design Champion role at each institution. All empty and new positions have been filled except seven institutions still in progress.
