GALILEO Support Activities

OpenAthens

Support services managed OpenAthens go live for Truett McConnell University and held kick off meetings for Live Oak Public Library, Luther Rice College & Seminary and Toccoa Falls College. Work will resume with Berry College as well.

The GALILEO redesign team continues to meet weekly on enhancements to GALILEO Search. Prior to July, GALILEO will create and update relevant FAQs, communication and training.

Affordable Materials Grants: ALG Awards 39 Proposals

ALG recently awarded more than \$500,000 to University System of Georgia faculty and instructors to expand access to online educational resources. These grants will save students an estimated \$1 million in the cost of course materials.

Award amounts ranged from \$2,000 to \$30,000. Georgia Gwinnett College garnered the highest award total with \$107,297 in grants for six projects. Kennesaw State University saw the highest number of projects awarded at seven with a total of \$79,025 in grants.

ALG awarded \$507,498 in funding for 39 proposals from 14 USG institutions. Ten of the projects will expand new, open educational resources across entire departments. Since its inception, the grant program has awarded more than \$6 million.

OpenALG Continues to Expand

There are more than 60 projects now listed at open textbooks in ALG's <u>website for open educational</u> <u>resources</u>, and more than 90 projects are listed as ancillary materials. In collaboration with Manifold, ALG is providing free, open access to these resources for the public. Subjects include mathematics, film, cartography, history, and more.

No-Cost, Low-Cost Courses Save Students Money

The University System of Georgia saved enrolled students \$22.8 million in educational costs during the recent fall semester, thanks to efforts to sustain courses that require little to no additional cost for materials, according to data collected by GALILEO.

In fall 2020, USG institutions reported 22.4 percent of course sections that required no- or low-cost materials. This is up from a year ago when 19.98 percent reported no- or low-cost course sections. These sections directly impacted 17.3 percent of course section enrollments by USG students more than 240,000 in total—up roughly 35,000 from fall 2019.

When counting eCore, these affordable courses have saved students \$100 million

Subgrant Applications due June 2, 2021

To broaden partner participation in the Digital Library of Georgia (DLG), DLG is soliciting proposals for historic digitization projects costing up to \$7500 in DLG services from non-profit Georgia cultural heritage institutions. Applicant organizations must be open to the public, and their collections must be available for public research either by appointment or through regular hours. Project metadata will be included in the DLG portal and the Digital Public Library of America (DPLA). Projects may include the reformatting of textual materials (not including newspapers), graphic materials, or audio-visual materials. Applicants should have materials prepared for a project start date of **September 1, 2021**.
