

Creating Direct Links to Articles in GALILEO

1. Search within a GALILEO database (ex. EBSCO Academic Search Complete) for an article with full text.
2. Copy down the citation information.
3. Click on “Journals A-Z” or “Magazines A-Z” tab within GALILEO. Then click on “Find Cited Article.”
4. Enter the citation information into the form and click on the “Find Citation” button.
